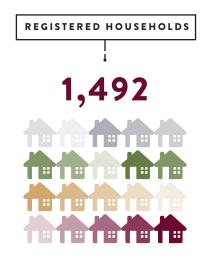
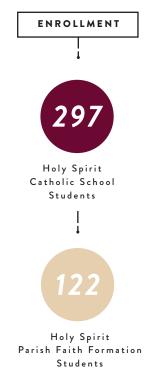


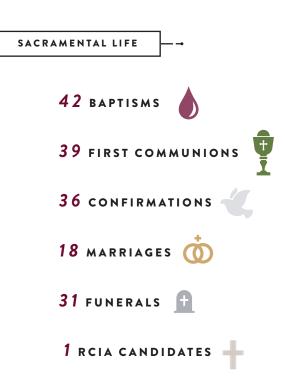

# **EXECUTIVE** SUMMARY

FISCAL 2019

# IF I HAD TO SUM UP FISCAL 2019 IN ONE WORD IT WOULD BE "CHANGE". LOOKING BACK ON '19 IT WAS A WHIRLWIND OF CHANGE FOR THE PARISH.

**JULY**— Fr. Mark Peacock assumes his responsibility as the seventh Pastor of Holy Spirit Parish. Fr Mike Steffes is assigned as parochial vicar. Plans begin to renovate the rectory. The children's collection is instituted at all the masses.

AUGUST— The rectory interior is repainted and all the flooring is replaced. This is completed with the help of many volunteers. We ready the school to accept over 300 students with the completion of remodeling two classrooms in the lower elementary. The Bishop celebrates Mass at Holy Spirit to formally install Fr Mark as pastor.

SEPTEMBER— We celebrate our festival with winds of change for this important parish event in the coming years. Finance Council reconvenes with the addition of two new members. The PTA holds the annual "Walking with the Spirit" event. Plans are in the works for a parish wide strategic planning meeting. Fr Mark volunteers Holy Spirit to be part of the pilot wave for the upcoming Diocesan Capital Campaign. We bring the first quarter of the fiscal year to a close with Sunday revenue being up nearly 6% over the previous year.

**OCTOBER**— The parish strategic planning meeting is held with all the leadership of the parish present. The strengths of the parish are identified as its location and facilities,

dynamically changing school, and leadership with a diverse skill set and a high level of education and institutional knowledge. Name Tag weekend is instituted at all the masses to get acquainted with fellow parishioners. Blackbaud is interviewed as a potential vendor for the new parish database. The budget committee begins work on the fiscal 2020 budget, which is sure to be a challenge with the upcoming Diocesan capital campaign.

NOVEMBER— The vision of the parish is identified as becoming a welcoming community where strangers feel at home and create a contagious energy whereby people want to be here. The school is a beacon of excellence in Catholic education where the barrier of tuition is eliminated. The Ministry of Greeters is created as an initial response to the vision.

DECEMBER— The Advent Season is brought in with Advent by Candlelight and Advent by Bonfire—attracting parishioners to socialize and reflect on the season. The Christmas season culminates with one of the largest one week collections in parish history at over \$71,000. The first Winter Party is held in the rectory. The parish Educational Foundation ends the calendar year with a fund balance of \$3.4 million.

JANUARY— The New Year rings in with mild weather and all the hope that a new year brings. Our Evenings of Worship welcome the addition of a dinner to entice people to stay and celebrate. Plans are in the works for "Agile Classroom" with the help of PTA and blessings from the Finance Council. Our child care program received its renewal license and an area in the school was inspected to

allow for growth in the program scheduled for the 19/20 school year. The parish households grew from 1,479 to 1,492 and we are notified that the church construction in Haiti is complete. The Foundation Auction for education is held at the Goei Center which nets \$141,000 to the Foundation balance.

FEBRUARY— The ministry scheduling software goes live bringing greater organization in scheduling ministers for weekend liturgies. The Educational Foundation approves \$170,000 in grants to the faith formation and school for fiscal 2020. The transition to the Blackbaud E-tapestry software begins. Polar vortex grips the state and gives the school the most winter closings in history. A comprehensive parish review begins which brings about numerous changes to "best practices" in the parish business office.

MARCH— CSA 2019 kicks off with the hope of being complete by Easter. The MCC conducts a risk management review of the parish, and the findings are reported to the Physical Plant Committee. Work begins on updating the Employee Handbook. The fund raising policy is approved by the Finance Council.

APRIL— Training is held for the upcoming Diocesan Capital Campaign. Air quality testing is completed in the rectory residence and mold is detected in the HVAC system, which requires a complete replacement of the system. The reorganization of the parish office staff begins to accommodate the required changes of the best practices review. The first Welcome Dinner is held for new parishioners. The 122 students enrolled in the parish Faith Formation program complete their academic year.

MAY— Our Parochial Vicar, Fr Mike, requests an official leave of absence from the priestly ministry. The Our Shepherds, Our Future campaign kicks off to address seminarian education and priest retirement. School enrollment for the 19/20 school year is nearly complete with an anticipated enrollment of 308 students.

JUNE— The school year wraps up for our students on June 11, and work immediately begins on classroom remodeling. Furniture is ordered for the "Agile Classroom" project with an anticipated delivery date of September 2019. A new "internal review committee" is formed under the Finance Council to oversee the best practices of the parish. The reviewed and updated employee handbook is adopted and distributed to employees. June 30 brings us to the culmination of another year in the parish life. We've recognized a 6% increase in our Sunday Offertory income, a 3% increase in our school enrollment, over \$180,000 raised for CSA, and \$1.1 million raised for Our Shepherds, Our Future, and the June 30 Foundation fund balance has grown to \$3.9 million. Just in time to start another year with only one thing certain...change.

# SCHOOL SUMMARY

Holy Spirit School was blessed to have our second consecutive year of enrollment growth as we had 297 students for the 2018-19 school year. This marks a 3% increase from the previous year, and our growth necessitated opening another session of three-year-old preschool. With the addition of Father Mark to our parish this year, we are excited for further growth in our school.

The faith development of our school community continues to be the center of our mission. This year our staff kept a Mass journal, an activity suggested by Dynamic Catholic's Matthew Kelly in which we write a meaningful sentence from each Mass in order to help us to live our faith more deeply. On the first Friday of each month, our all-school Mass included the Anointing of the Sick, and our students surrounded the anointed in order to pray over them during the sacrament. A group of 8th grade students were trained to be Eucharistic Ministers during our school liturgies and were encouraged to minister at weekend Masses. During Advent we performed the Las Posadas Christmas program, held a birthday party for Jesus, and collected enough money to donate 167 water filters to the Seguin, Haiti community. Our Lenten season was highlighted by all-school Stations of the Cross each Friday. In continuing our Be Nice/Be Christ theme, each class wrote positive attributes about each classmate on individual posters with each student's picture in the center. We also had reciprocal visits with Rwandan refugees in Grand Rapids that included dinner, ice cream socials, and game nights.

This year we implemented a Silent Sustained Reading (SSR) program for one hour per week in order to increase students' reading comprehension and fluency. While the students were reading their book of choice, the teachers were reading The Four Gospels - Little Rock Scripture Study. We also introduced students and parents to the Protect Young Eyes internet and social media safety program as a way to navigate those avenues in a Christian manner.

We continued our quest to bring more people to campus who are not regular visitors to Holy Spirit. We initiated a Grandparents' Day in October that brought 270 grandparents to campus to celebrate Mass with their grandchildren, tour the school, learn about our philosophy, and have lunch in the Activity Center. In the spring, 85 Holy Spirit students teamed up to perform the musical Dr. Dolittle, Jr. The three performances of the show brought over 500 people to our campus. We also started a Facebook advertising campaign and renewed our marketing contracts with Diocesan Publications and Holy Family Radio in order to reach a broader market for Holy Spirit.

Our objective data for the year indicates that we continue to improve on multiple fronts. The spring 2019 Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) results showed that our students exceeded the national average in all 24 categories by an average of 34%. We also exceeded the diocesan average in 23 of 24 categories and were higher by an average of 11%. The 5th and 8th grade students took the Assessment of Catholic Religious Education (ACRE) test and exceeded the national Catholic school average in 7 of 8 pillars and 11 of 12 domains. On the Catholic Identity Survey administered by the Diocese of Grand Rapids, results from parents and staff were far above the diocesan average.

Financially we had another solid year as we finished \$28,000 under budget, which helped to offset the needed parish investment in our operation. Our 11th annual Walking with the Spirit was a resounding success as we set records for highest amount of student pledges and highest amount of total revenue. The Grand Gathering auction was also a huge success, including a \$5,000 gift to San Juan Diego Academy as the charitable recipient of this year's auction.

# THE CHILD

## **DEVELOPMENT CENTER**

The Child Development Center (CDC) saw an increase in enrollment in preschool during the 2018-2019 school year. Our preschool program saw an increase in enrollment by 7 children, and an afternoon session of three-year-old preschool was opened due to high demand for the program. The preschool program had a total of 55 children enrolled during the 2018-2019 school year. The preschool program theme, "God Called the Children Two by Two," was based on the bible story of Noah's Ark. The theme was intertwined throughout the year in various activities and in the end of the year memory book. The preschool program continues to thrive and provide many extra educational opportunities including field trips for the four-year-old preschoolers and weekly Spanish lessons for both the three and four-year-old preschoolers.

The CDC Child Care also saw an increase in revenue due to the high demand for quality child care services; the child care program recorded the highest year of revenue to date of \$253,628.69. There were 115 children enrolled in the school year program and 83 children in the CDC summer care program. The CDC is one of the few child care programs that remains open in the summer months within the Diocese of Grand Rapids. The successful marketing of our summer care program to other schools in the Diocese has resulted in about 25% of the children enrolled in the Holy Spirit Summer Care Program coming from other schools within the diocese. The theme for Summer Care 2019 was "Summer Safari," and the child care used a candy theme for the school year 2018-2019 based on "Discovering How Sweet Our Connections with Jesus and Our Friends Can Be." These themes are revisited throughout the year during active learning and play.

Research indicates the need to actively engage students during the summer months to maintain high academic performance; the summer care program uses both a summer reading program and hands on field trip opportunities to keep the children learning and playing all summer long! Students went on weekly field trips to many places, including Deer Tracks Junction, Tree Runner Adventure Park, Circle Theatre, KROC Center for swimming, Great Lakes GLOW Golf, Swiss Lanes Dairy Discovery Farm, and more. Additionally, the children had visits at the CDC from The Grand Rapids Junior Ballet Company, a pet care and safety demonstration by the West Michigan Humane Society, a bubble science demonstration, ceramic painting with the Mud Room, karate lessons with Super T. Karate, and an AMR Ambulance tour!

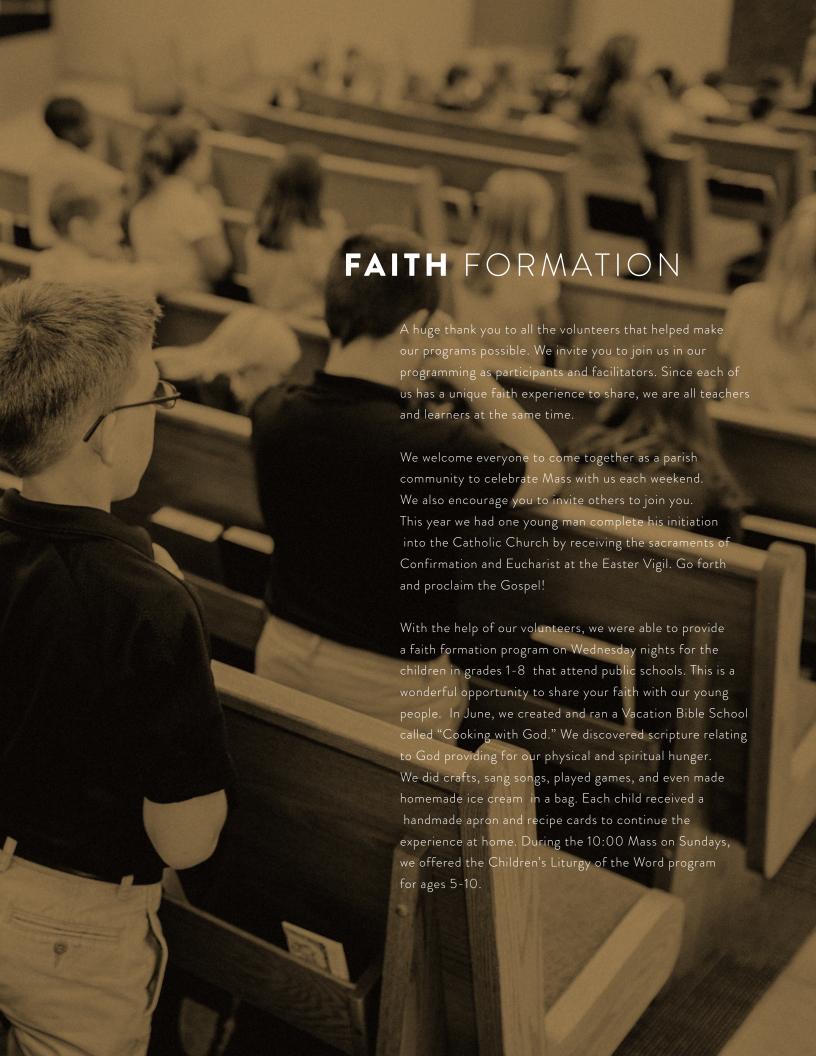
The summer reading program required the children to read for a minimum of 20 minutes per day and allots extra prizes for logging additional reading each day. Each child participating receives a certificate of participation along with various prizes donated by local businesses including free kids drinks from Biggby, a free personal pan pizza from Pizza Hut, and two for one certificates for Altitude Trampoline Park. Additionally, there were several grand prize drawings for all participants in the Holy Spirit Summer Care Reading Program for free bowling for a group of four!

The CDC was blessed with gifts from the Holy Spirit Grand Gathering Auction in January 2019. The Child Development Center child care and preschool received two new 100% recycled plastic picnic tables for the habitat area, a listening center for literacy enhancement, and large outdoor storage boxes for outside equipment.

We provided classes for parents, as well as the children, on the sacraments of Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Eucharist, and Confirmation. These parent classes were provided to enable them to help support their children's sacramental preparation. This year was the first time that we were able to provide the opportunity for parents to receive the sacrament along with their children. Fr. Mark brought in multiple priests for the First Reconciliation liturgy. The number of parents that took advantage of this special opportunity to model the faith for their children was awesome. For some, it was the catalyst to return to the sacrament after many years of being away.

Advent had our annual event of Advent by Candlelight, with guest speaker, Kathryn Mulderink. The Advent Family Gathering potluck/prayer service was overflowing with people. The men's Advent by Bonfire exploded with participation as Fr. Mark's enthusiasm caught fire. Monsignor Duncan rounded out the season with a special presentation for the parish.

We provided our parishioners with meditations for the liturgical seasons with the "Little Books," Dynamic Catholic books, and the "Growing in Faith" monthly publications. We provided every parish family with a free subscription to the Faith Magazine from the diocese and a parish subscription to Formed.org. This website offers a plethora of Catholic videos, books, movies, bible studies and weekly reading reflections at no cost to you. Simply check out hsparish.org for the link.

We continued our commitment to providing a safer environment for all the children in our parish through running background checks, providing the "Protecting God's Children" awareness sessions, and teaching the Touching Safety lessons to the children to enlighten and empower them.

We offered Bishop Barron's video series "The Mass" at Covenant Village. Dynamic Catholic's "The Turning Point" bible study on the Gospel of John was offered during the day and evening.

This year had us taking some new adventures! We created a training program for Eucharistic Ministers and secured a volunteer to head this ministry. We established a funeral visitation team to lead the rosary/ scripture services. We ventured into online scheduling for the liturgical ministries. After some initial growing pains, it seems to be a very positive step for our volunteers and the weekend liturgies.

Looking towards the future, we would like to establish a pool of individuals to assist those interested in becoming Catholic by attending Mass with them, attending parish events with them, and providing a welcoming face to help them on their journey into the Church. We are interested in hearing your ideas for programs and events too. As always, we invite you to get involved in our programs and the parish. We are always looking for people to share their faith and life as a Catholic.

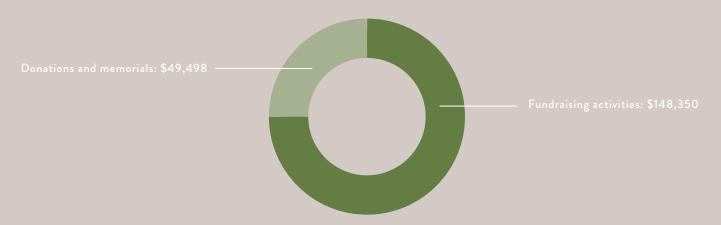

## A GRAND GATHERING

The Educational Foundation holds a special celebration and fundraising event every two years. This "Grand Gathering" helps make possible many of the Catholic education programs of the Parish. In addition to the social aspects of the event, attendees have the opportunity to bid on a variety of exciting experience packages and outstanding items at a live auction. The event also gives people the opportunity to help fund (at "giving stations") specific needs of the Church and School as well as help fund our tuition assistance program.

This year's event was held in January of 2019. With over 350 guests attending the Foundation raised \$162,300, after expenses. This money will help provide a wide variety of education programs and fill some of the specific needs of the Church and School. One of those items is tuition assistance – the auction raised \$65,900, enough to cover half of one year's need, a vital contribution to one of education's largest expenses. In addition to those in attendance we had 22 Honorary Co-chairs that provided significant funding for the event and matched amounts given for specific items. Their contributions and leadership made the auction possible and profitable.

The Foundation is pleased to bring this outstanding social event to the Parish. The auction is known for great food and spirited, fun filled, bidding. While raising money for Catholic Education, attendees have a great time mingling and chatting with a broad spectrum of Parishioners.

#### **NEW CHURCH**

The Seguin Church is almost complete. Over the past several years, Holy Spirit Parish has funded the building of the church. To finish the church, we need the windows installed, paint for the interior and exterior, and wiring for electricity that will be provided by a generator when needed. A new bell was purchased for the church and sent by sea container this past April.

The reason the church is not complete is that there is currently a fuel shortage, and inflation has jumped 20% since January. The decision was made to wait for material, labor, and transportation prices to drop. The church is currently being used and has decorative bars on all windows to secure it when not in use.

We ask that you keep Haiti in your prayers that the shortage can come to an end and prices go back to normal.

#### **NEW COMMITTEE MEMBERS**

The Haiti Committee welcomes all parishioners to join our committee. Travel to Haiti is not a requirement, and your input is welcome and important.

#### WATER

In 2018 the Holy Spirit School students for their Advent project held a penny war. This Advent activity was fun and at the same time educational. Our students learned the value of helping others have access to clean water and the importance of having clean water. The students added 167 new water filter units to the filters already purchased through our Haiti collection. This brought the number of units in Seguin to 1,150 providing clean water to approximately 8,000 people.

#### **EDUCATION**

In 2001 we made a commitment to pay the salaries of teachers for our school of 55 students. Today we have 16 teachers with 650 children in the school. Our grade levels have increased from 4 levels in 2001 to 10 levels of education along with one preschool and two kindergarten classes.

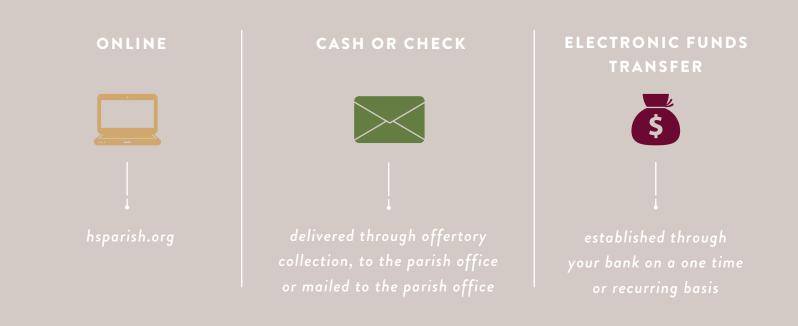

#### GIVING IS EASY AND CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED IN MANY WAYS:



#### TRIBUTES AND MEMORIALS

Gifts can always be given in honor or memory of a loved one or family member. Since gifts made to The Foundation are added to the endowment and carefully invested, rather than given away, they continue to provide financial assistance to Holy Spirit School in perpetuity. To give a gift in honor or memory of a loved one is actually to give a "Forever Gift" on behalf of that person.

#### **LEGACY GIFTS**

Donors who have supported Catholic education over the years can continue that patronage through strategic estate planning. Appreciated stocks, real estate, life insurance policies, 401K funds, or tangible personal property can all be donated or willed to Holy Spirit. #### IRA REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION (RMD)

Tangible personal property or professional services can be given to support Holy Spirit. These gifts may be eligible for a deduction of the item's fair market value, if the gift is related to the "charitable purpose" of Holy Spirit.
